313

00:17:34 --> 00:17:38 I understand. However, I'd like to emphasize again

314

00:17:38 --> 00:17:42 that this deal is Craig's best chance of minimizing jail time.

315

00:17:42 --> 00:17:45 You're telling us there are drug dealers

316

00:17:45 --> 00:17:47 and murderers walking the streets,

317

00:17:47 --> 00:17:50 but instead of them, they wanna put an innocent man in jail?

318

00:17:50 --> 00:17:53 There's no other way? I'm sorry.

319

00:17:53 --> 00:17:56 I think under the circumstances, this is your best option. 320
