00:21:47 --> 00:21:50 -So Jimmy's own brother blocked him? ALLEY: Objection.

378

00:21:50 --> 00:21:53 How are the hiring practices of Hamlin Hamlin McGill relevant here?

379

> 391 00:22:35 --> 00:22:38 ...he brought his brother food, supplies...

392 00:22:38 --> 00:22:40 ...even his favorite newspapers. Isn't that right?

> 393 00:22:40 --> 00:22:41 He did.

> > 394

00:22:42 --> 00:22:46 KIM: Could you speak to the terms of Charles' leave of absence?

> 395 00:22:46 --> 00:22:47 You know I can't.

396 00:22:47 --> 00:22:49 It was an FMLA leave.

397

00:22:50 --> 00:22:51 Anything more is confidential.

398

00:22:52 --> 00:22:54 You can confirm it was due to mental illness?

399

00:22:54 --> 00:22:57 Objection. Charles McGill's mental health isn't at issue.

400

00:22:57 --> 00:23:01 This is a smear job on the State Bar's upcoming witness. Nothing more.

401

00:23:01 --> 00:23:03 This is not a competency hearing.

402

00:23:03 --> 00:23:05 Mr. Hamlin is not a psychiatric professional.

> > 512

00:30:23 --> 00:30:26 Without physical evidence, I felt that a recorded confession...
