4. The Cost of Intellect

The script treats intelligence as both shield and curse. Alma's brilliance isolates her; her moral calculus collapses under its own logic.

Screenwriting Takeaway:

- Smart characters are hardest to write. Give them emotional blind spots.
- Intellect without empathy is fertile ground for tragedy.

5. The Institutional Thriller

Like *TÁR* or *The Paper Chase*, *After the Hunt* thrives in confined spaces -- classrooms, faculty lounges, disciplinary hearings... where prestige hides predation.

- Confinement heightens tension; the setting becomes a pressure cooker.
- Bureaucracy is the perfect antagonist — faceless, polite, and unstoppable.

Legacy:

After the Hunt joins a growing canon of psychological dramas where intellect becomes its own villain. Garrett's writing exposes how prestige systems feed on moral compromise, and how truth, once weaponized, can destroy its wielder. For writers, it's a reminder that the sharpest thrillers are those that cut through ethics, not flesh.

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
