- Close loops with visual and structural symmetry.
- Reward audiences with echoes that feel earned, not recycled.

5. The Future You Make

The final scene -- Doc's steam-powered time train -- delivers the trilogy's ultimate lesson: the future is unwritten. Having mastered the past, Marty and Doc embrace the unknown with agency and optimism. It's not destiny... it's authorship.
