- Write action as subtext.
- Combat should reveal belief systems and values.

5. The Heroine's Voice in a Man's World

Through the Bride, Tarantino reclaims the revenge genre for female agency. Strength stems from empathy, endurance, and will.

- Redefine heroism through vulnerability.
- Let femininity amplify ferocity, not soften it.
