Major turning points (Jedi purge, Padmé's death) are carefully spaced for maximum impact.

- Emotional pacing is as crucial as plot pacing.
- Let characters (and audiences) feel the consequences of choices.

Revenge of the Sith is considered the strongest of the prequels. It's rich in tragedy, transformation, and symbolic storytelling, making it essential viewing-and study-for aspiring screenwriters.
