4. Intimacy in Violence

Safdie films combat like confession: every punch is personal, every breath heavy with meaning.

Screenwriting Takeaway:

- Don't write violence for spectacle; write it for revelation.
- Fight scenes can reveal shame, fear, or love more than words can.

5. The Price of Performance

Kerr's body becomes his currency, his identity, and his prison. Safdie's script turns the athlete's regimen into ritual -- devotion that devours.

Screenwriting Takeaway:

- Obsession is a dramatic engine.
- Explore how routine becomes religion, and religion becomes ruin.

Legacy:

The Smashing Machine stands beside *Raging Bull* and *The Wrestler* as a modern tragedy of the body -- a portrait of manhood collapsing under its own mythology. Benny Safdie writes not just a fighter's fall, but a filmmaker's prayer for empathy in a violent age.

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
