5. The Supernatural as Allegory:

Immortality and shapeshifting reflect themes of transformation, choice, and desire. Genre serves as a mirror for growing up and giving up.

- Genre should express emotional stakes.
- Let fantasy sharpen -- not soften -- your themes.
