#### 4. Tone: Absurd Yet Sincere:

Weird Science balances slapstick spectacle with emotional honesty. Hughes never mocks his heroes' vulnerability; instead, the humor amplifies their sincerity. The outrageous visuals stay grounded in authentic feeling.

- Humor should heighten, not undercut, emotional truth.

#### 5. The Courage to Grow Up:

Gary and Wyatt's final victory isn't romance -- it's responsibility. The lesson isn't how to "get the girl," but how to become worthy of real relationships. In embracing vulnerability, they outgrow the fantasy that created Lisa in the first place.

- End arcs with maturity, not indulgence.
- Growth dissolves the fantasy once the need is met.
